Annual Friends Meeting (AFM): Sat 7th April 2018

AFM Introduction (Glen McGowan)

Glen opened the meeting with a brief welcome and introduction. He first thanked all the volunteers that had enabled the FoYW to operate and open the tower to the

public. Our main income comes from donations, which are given in gratitude for the efforts of the volunteers. The Tower was open for 28 days, welcoming over 8,000 visitors and raising over £3,000 of income.

Formed 7 years ago by just 5 people, we are now a charity with hundreds of members and dozens of volunteers, and open up parts of the walls not previously accessible to the public.

The FoYW has had a successful year which had started just after we signed a lease on the Tower with the City of York Council. We have now carried out our first repair to the Tower (the door) and half the cost of this essential first item was paid by York Civic Trust, to whom we are most grateful. We are now planning further renovations and developments, starting with electrical supply sometime this summer.

We have invited the main speaker, Carolyn Lloyd Brown - 'The Heritage Angel' - to join us today as we need guidance on the best ways to develop the Tower for our visitors and to obtain grants towards the costs.

AFM Treasurer's Report (Richard Hanage)

In presenting the accounts for 2017 Richard (standing in for Treasurer Penny Heptonstall) briefly covered four key points, as shown in the slide below.

2017 Summary




- '2017' covers 11 months
 - Brings the financial year in line with operational year.
- Surplus: £2,280
 - Mostly 'Open Day' income (£2,541) and 'Sponsored Stones' (£486)
 - 2015 was similar, but 2016 was much higher due to Illuminating York income (extra £1,736).
- Assets: £14,121 (up £2,280)
 - Verv useful reserve.
- Now starting to spend on development projects
 - Using reserve and (hopefully) grants.

AFM Membership Report (Martin Hetherington)

Martin described several key aspects of volunteer activities in 2017. Visitor numbers continue to be very strong, as shown below:

As the Tower can get over-crowded we recently have been restricting numbers a little to give visitors a better experience.






We are waiting for the new wood in the door to age a bit before it is sealed and will also ask Historic England for permission to add more metal studs.

Walls Fact-check service? Simon Mattam

Late in February a new video guide to the Walls went on line (<u>click here to see</u> <u>it</u>). It told us 'the walls themselves were restored by the Vikings' and went on to tell us of the garderobe inside Red Tower [in fact there is none].

For me, this raised a very familiar question: 'should I correct them?'. Of course it is always safer to say nothing – I may be the one who is mistaken and even if I am right on the facts perhaps I am wrong when it comes to the rules of politeness – and from the vague mists of my past comes the warning: 'no-one likes a know-it-all'. But, I say to myself, $\underline{\mathbf{I}}$ would want to know, though I might not enjoy being told], and surely to do nothing is to collude in others being misled. Facts matter.


I think the makers of the new video guide had been misled on the Vikings by the current Wikipedia entry on the Walls – as they also included Wikipedia's assertion that 'Monk Bar ... retains its portcullis in working order'. People are also slightly misled on the portcullis by the large information board [photographed below], it claims that the portcullis was 'raised and lowered until 1970' - which, if correct, would rather spoil the story that it has never worked since the time it was lowered for the present Queen's coronation and got stuck [a true story, I believe – but do correct me!].

Wikipedia invites corrective editing but you'd expect information boards to be thoroughly checked and reliable [except when outdated].

The photograph below, supposedly of Red Tower, is from a board currently displayed in York District Hospital and originally part of a York800 display in YorkExplore. Red Tower has probably gone through a number of transformations before its current one, but the tower shown here atop its substantial earth mound is most probably Harlot Hill Tower just south of Monk Bar.

We all make mistakes, even the writers of the mainly excellent leaflet ['The Walls'] that the CYC webpage on the city walls sends you to for history. It says of an area overlooked by the Walls: '...Jewbury ... occupied in medieval times by the Jewish community after they were expelled from the city in 1290' when this was the date all Jews were expelled from England.

Should Friends of York Walls try to offer a free fact-check service to anyone who aims to tell people about the Walls? I think telling people of such a service might be a polite way of approaching those we think are spreading misinformation – and a way of avoiding telling people what they won't listen to or act on.

As such a service has not yet been agreed on by FoYW, I summoned up my courage and offered a personal fact-check to 'todoinyork' – and was surprised at their instant acceptance, even enthusiasm.
